Overview: Welcome to the class! The purpose of this assignment is to prepare students who are entering PLS 135 / Dual Enrollment U.S. Government & Politics for the 2024-2025 school year. This assignment will serve as a preview and a practice opportunity for the types of assignments that you will be responsible for during this course. This will count as a formative "assignment" grade for MP1. I will not be checking my email daily over the summer, but feel free to email me with any questions and I will respond as soon as I can.

Due Date: The assignment will be due by 11:59 PM on Monday, September 9th. The assignment should be uploaded to the appropriate assignment on NOVA Canvas as a Microsoft Word document.

Rationale: Through this assignment, students will be introduced to two big themes for the beginning of the year. These themes will be important for MP1 and the rest of the year.

- <u>Necessary elements for a democracy:</u> What are the core elements, pillars, structures, or institutions that a country needs to have to be considered a democracy? A "successful" democracy? Besides "having" these in practice, how can one assess whether they are functioning the way they need to be?
- <u>Democratic backsliding:</u> Democratic backsliding can be defined as "[the] process of political change in which countries that enjoy a certain level of democracy become significantly less democratic." One can also understand this process as "the state-led debilitation or elimination of any of the political institutions that sustain an existing democracy." In recent years, the globe has witnessed this phenomenon in countries in all regions of the world. Why, and how, do countries "backslide" in their levels of democracy and what can individuals, governments, or organizations do to stop this retreat?

Every time you begin a new thought, idea, or point, you should begin a new paragraph. Paragraphs should follow the standard structure of:

- Intro / Topic Sentence
- Evidence with a lead-in
- Analysis (explanation)
- Conclusion
